Comfort engaging with a demographically diverse congregation—across ages, beliefs, economic situations, vocations, and political philosophies.

Demonstrating authentic care for those in the congregation and providing wise counsel, while also equipping Clergy, Deacons, and Lay Leaders to do the same, so that everyone who needs care can receive it

Engaging with the secular culture and leading our church to navigate wisely the issues and challenges of our time. Collaborating and building relationships with institutions and churches alike, across the theological and political spectrum.

# SMALL GROUPS

We believe that where we actually live is exceedingly important. That is why we meet weekly in geographically based small groups, where we eat together, read the Bible, pray, share, serve one another, and reach out to our neighbors. We currently have almost 20 small groups, with over 200 adults actively involved.



#### CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

Children are capable of deep relationships with God, and we desire for them to sense His love, enjoy His presence, and experience abundant life with Him. We offer age-appropriate programs for children, including Catechesis of the Good Shepherd and the New City Catechism.



#### YOUTH MINISTRY

Our Youth Ministry seeks to help middle and high school students' faith come alive, by fully embracing the Lord Jesus Christ and His Kingdom in the midst of the secular age.



# **ESSENTIALS CLASS**

We strive for unity around a basic expression of "mere Christianity." Our Essentials class is designed for those pursuing membership, as well as anyone who's interested in understanding the core beliefs and practices of Christian life together.



### KUSH ANGLICAN CHURCH

We partnered with Bishop-in-Exile Andudu Adam Elnail to form Kush Anglican Church in 2015. The congregation meets in our building and includes Arabic speaking refugees from Sudan and other sub-Saharan nations. Our staff provides ongoing support for the church and its leadership.



# PASTORAL RESIDENCY (CURACY)

Since 2010, six Curates have been trained and equipped for ministry through our Pastoral Residency program. As a paid position with full benefits, this program provides a wide range of ministry opportunities suited to each Curate's gifts, abilities, and eventual ministry focus, with several forms of mentorship available.



#### DIACONATE MINISTRY

We train up Deacons in areas such as pastoral care, community outreach, liturgical duties, and church administration. The program aims to equip participants with the theological knowledge, spiritual formation, and leadership skills necessary to serve effectively within the church and the broader community.



### \*NEW\* URBAN PUBLIC PARK SPACE

We are working with Harrisonburg Downtown Renaissance to transform our church's parking lot into a beautiful, multi-use green space that enhances the city's aesthetic and fosters community. With lush landscaping, public art, and space for outdoor concerts, playgrounds, and food trucks, this park will serve as a central gathering place for the city. Watch WHSV news feature.

# OUR HISTORY

Envisioned in 2009 by several families, the Church of the Incarnation has by God's grace grown from meeting in a living room to worshipping as a medium-sized congregation in our own beautiful, newly renovated building. Now with over 250 members, 19 active small groups, and diverse ministries, we continue to seek the flourishing of God's Kingdom in Harrisonburg and beyond.

#### 2010

Called Aubrey Spears to serve as our Rector. Grew to over 40 people meeting in the Spears' living room every Sunday.

#### 2012

Grew to over 80 people. Outgrew the Madison Mortgages building and purchased the Auto Parts, Inc. building at 292 N. Liberty Street. Welcomed first Curate.

#### 2014

Grew to over 110 members. Welcomed second Curate. Launched our Fellows Program, which trained young adults for living out their faith through their vocations.

#### 2016

With Bishop Andudu, helped plant an Arabicspeaking congregation, Kush Anglican Church, which continues to meet in our building. Welcomed third and fourth Curates.

#### 2018

Added a second worship service and began preparing to plant a church in Staunton, VA. N.T. Wright, Jemar Tisby, and Curt Thompson speak at our Cafe Veritas events.

#### 2020

Planted Restoration Anglican Church in Staunton, VA. Raised \$3,000,000 towards the renovation of the Carter Bank Building. Started Pax Dei for Nuba, a non-profit partnership with the Diocese of Kadugli. Welcomed fifth Curate.

#### 2022

Moved into renovated building, which can seat 300+ and provides children's space, church offices, and shared community spaces. Launched Youth Confirmation Program and Catechesis of the Good Shepherd. Hosted Cafe Veritas event with Bruce Herman, Ed Knippers, and Ken Myers.

#### 2024

Hosted the Cafe Veritas event, "The Death of Democracy?" with Matthew Kaemingk. Aubrey Spears moved to Houston, Texas to serve at Apostles Houston. Started our search for a new Rector. Michael Goheen accepted our invitation to serve as our guest preacher for the fall.

#### 2011

Outgrew the Spears' house and moved worship services into the Madison Mortgages building on East Market Street.

#### 2013

Completed most renovations and moved into building. Sent out Curate Luke Kunefke to serve at an Anglican church in Houston, TX.

#### 2015

Launched Godly Play Children's Ministry.
Completed building renovation, which enlarged our sanctuary and created more space for children. Planted the Church of the Lamb with Curate Kevin Whitfield in Elkton, VA.

#### 2017

Grew to over 190 members. Helped plant the Church of the Holy Cross in Crozet, VA.

#### 2019

Received a \$300,000 grant to expand our Curacy Program. Outgrew the Liberty Street building and purchased the Carter Bank Building. Sold Liberty Street building to Christ Presbyterian Church.

#### 2021

Launched Arts Incarnate and Diaconate Ministry. Hired former Curate, Keith Breault, as our Associate Rector.


### 2023

Hired former Curate, Wilson West, as our first full-time Pastor of Youth and Worship. Launched our public park project. Welcomed our sixth Curate. Hosted a nine-week series, "A Better Story," which explored the topic of sex, gender, and sexuality.



# OUR FINANCES

The Church of the Incarnation has consistently demonstrated financial responsibility and strong stewardship, guided by the oversight of our Parish Council.

Over the past few years, we have experienced significant growth, both in the number of attendees and in the resulting tithes and offerings, which have seen an almost 50% increase since 2020. This remarkable growth is a testament to the faith and dedication of our new and existing members who are actively supporting the mission and work of our church.

### OUR CHURCH BUILDING

Our congregation donated \$3,550,000 towards the purchase and renovation of our new church building—a reflection of our generosity and broad recognition of how our ministry, grounded in the teaching of the gospel, is reaching and transforming lives within our community.



### OUR RECTOR'S DISCRETIONARY FUND

Demonstrating a deep commitment to the Biblical practice of almsgiving, our parish honors this tradition through our Rector's Discretionary Fund. Each year, approximately \$50,000, given generously by our congregation outside of the regular budget, provides essential support to those in need within our church and the surrounding community. This enables us to extend care and compassion beyond our walls, offering assistance during times of crisis and ensuring that our faith is expressed through tangible acts of kindness.



#### OUR PARK PROJECT

Furthering our commitment to community engagement, we have partnered with state and local organizations, securing grants to transform our parking lot into a park that will serve both the church and the broader community. This project highlights our dedication to enhancing communal spaces and fostering stronger connections with our neighbors.



## **OUR CURACY PROGRAM**

Our Curacy Program, recognized for its excellence in preparing future leaders within the Anglican Church, has received multiple grants, including from Made to Flourish and the Diocese of Christ Our Hope. This support ensures that our vital work in developing clergy will continue to shape the future of our faith community.

# HARRISONBURG: THE FRIENDLY CITY

Nestled in the heart of the Shenandoah Valley, Harrisonburg delivers a wonderful, eclectic mix of agriculture, education, arts, outdoors, and culinary delights. The pace of life is just a little slower and simpler. "I can't believe I get to live here!" is a common refrain, as are comparisons to Mayberry and Tolkien's Shire.

Our history is deeply agrarian and agriculture is still a strong force in our local economy and culture. At our Saturday morning Farmers' Market, you'll find a diverse set of local vendors—from conservative Mennonites to immigrant business owners. Our coffee shops, restaurants, bars, and breweries have all flourished in this environment.

Harrisonburg draws people from all over the world, thanks to our thriving colleges and universities (including James Madison University, Eastern Mennonite University, Bridgewater College, Blue Ridge Community College, Mary Baldwin University, Washington & Lee University, Virginia Military Institute, University of Virginia, and Shenandoah University—all within a one-hour drive), as well as our role as a designated refugee resettlement area. As a result, our community is quite cosmopolitan, with people immigrating here from over 50 countries.
